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## Art Notes

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t's the most fabulous fall ... Along Colquitt's Gallery Row, **Geri Hooks** celebrates her 35th, a noteworthy occasion marked by a luscious exhibit of **Toulouse-Lautrec**'s sinuous works on paper (September 18 – October 16) ... Happy anniversary to **Franny Koelsch**, who hits 10. Up this month, a group-themed show addressing contemporary feminism (opening Thursday, September 9) ... Two highly important exhibits:

Jessica Stockholder's optimistic sculptural assemblages, billed as "between home and Home Depot" at **Blaffer Gallery** (September 18 – November 21) is counterpoised with the artist's site-specific installation at **Rice University Art Gallery** (September 16 – October 31) ... **Gremillion & Co. Fine Art, Inc.**, has **Gary Komarin**'s opulent oils (September 9 – October 11). Komarin, a recipient of the prestigious Joan Mitchell Foundation 1999 Painters & Sculptors Grant, studied with the late master **Philip Guston** ... **The New Gallery/Thom Andriola** is showing **Tara Conley** (September 18 – October 24), featuring the winsome sculptor's soft-fiber constructions and installations. (FYI, Conley's just been scooped up by Manhattan dealer **Mike Weiss.**) ... At **McMurtrey Gallery**, the transcendental paintings of **Mihailo Vukelic** are the closest we've seen to contemporary icons (September 18 – October 16) ... **McClain Gallery**, the anchor of the Richmond Avenue corridor, features **Angelina Nasso**'s luminous abstract works on paper (opening September 16), while word's out that **Frank Stella**'s stunning sculpture will arrive at the end of month ... And did we mention, **DiverseWorks**' oh so pertinent probe into presidential politics, with new media artists **Margaret Crane** and **Jon Winet**'s 2004: America &The Globe (September 16 – November 6) paired with **Karin Giusti**'s Rolling White House Review (September 16), the latter with a one-fourth scale model of the White House and a voter registration kiosk. Stomp Around, Thursday, September 16, 6 to 9 pm ... Paul Horn the provocateur is at it again, taking his wacky — yet important — weirdness to Deborah Colton Gallery. Don't miss "Camp Lucky: Summer of Carnage" (September 10 – 18), curated by the brilliant prankster whose work has been reviewed by Art in America and Artforum ... Sculptor Sharon Engelstein, known for her machine-made abstractions, explores the ceramic medium at Mixture Contemporary Art (September 10 – October 9) ... Work by the late Alfred Jensen, an internationally touted painter whose 2001 Dia Center for the Arts retrospective was absolutely enthralling, appears at Texas Gallery
