And at Gallery Sonja Roesch, Houston painter Jonathan Leach serves up a superb melding of architecture and abstraction informed by a fresh color palette (through August 29) ... New views: G Gallery presents our favorite neurosurgeon-artist, hometown doc John Berry, whose photographs are populated by angel activity (August 1 – 31) ... At Deborah Colton Gallery, NYC downtown scenester Maripol is paired with Saks Fifth Avenue Houston's Luis Arsenio Gonzalez; the former's "Little Red Riding Hood" show marries photography with drawing and textiles, while the

Just in: James Surls jets in to speak Wednesday, August 26, as LAC hits 30 ... Gallerist Apama Mackey curates the intriguingly titled "Paramilitary Show," activating the historic Houston Fire Museum (2403 Milam) with hometown notables Sharon Engelstein, collector and art car artist Ann Harithas, J Hill, Ariane Roesch, Wayne Gilbert, and Patrick Renner, all alongside internationals Luciana Abait and Ronald Moran (through September 19) ... Knit one, purl two at Houston Center for Contemporary Craft's subversive "Unknitting: Challenging Contemporary Traditions" (through September 13) ... Contemplate El Franco Lee II's urban-flavored paintings, which pulse with a hip hop beat at Art League Houston (through August 28), while Ken Mazzu showcases adroit new watercolors at Galveston Arts Center in Exile at the historic Panama Hotel on the island (through August 9). Wedded Bliss: Gallerist Bevin Bering is engaged to collector-type Dan Dubrowski, with an October wedding in the works ... Mr. Houston Painting, aka Dick Wray, and Florida-based financial wizard Beth Collins celebrated their nuptials with a reception at Wray's dealer, Wade Wilson Art. Snap, Dazzle and Pop

An '80s scenester clicks with the season.

erusing the pages of Maripol's book of Polaroids, "Maripolarama," taken between 1976 and 1992, you might think you have stumbled onto a time warp. Is that really a decades-old picture of Edwige and Bianca Jagger, and not an outtake from the latest Marc Jacobs show? Those big jackets that Klaus Nomi is wearing sure look a lot like the new Margiela. And isn't that the same punkish hair and makeup featured in Steven Meisel's recent story for Italian Vogue?

The 1980s, for those of you who have been hibernating in a Norma Kamali sleeping-bag coat, are back. And Maripol, a photographer, stylist and designer who helped define that era's downtown scene, is enjoying a well-deserved comeback. Aside from her Polaroids, which rival Warhol's for their fabulous cast of characters (Grace Jones, Debbie Harry, Keith Haring et al.), Maripol was famous for her inexpensive jewelry, which was initially sold at Fiorucci and then at Maripolitan, her boutique on Bleecker Street. Maripol also worked on videos and ad

campaigns with Jean-Paul Goude, and you can thank her for the rubber bangles that were copied and sold around the world after her friend Madonna wore them from wrist to elbow during her "Lucky Star" period. "Meeting Madonna was a blessing," Maripol says, "but then everybody copied me." Maripolitan went bankrupt in 1986.

But style hunters who weren't around for Maripol's first iteration will soon be able to experience the French expat's singular brand of cool. She is working on a line of fluorescent Lucite bracelets, necklaces inspired by sea urchins (Maripol is an enthusiastic scuba diver) and, possibly, T-shirt dresses with updated

versions of her favorite geometric motifs, to be sold at Marc by Marc Jacobs boutiques early next year. Says Jacobs: "I love the naïve, simple vibe and eccentricity of Maripol's designs."

But why exactly is it that designers are as drawn to the '80s as Proust to a madeleine? "That was the last era when there was a sense of freedom and do-it-yourself spirit," Maripol says. "Style wasn't laid out. You didn't need to be a millionaire to start something, and you didn't need to have P.R. to talk to somebody—there was no need to hide behind walls of communication."

If only that trend could be revived....
